COURSE OVERVIEW

Hello, and welcome to the *Foundations of Business Analysis* course presented by UC Davis Continuing and Professional Education. Business Analysis is a challenging but rewarding career path, and I look forward to discussing with you some of the basic concepts and processes that define the profession.

This course is designed to introduce students to the field of Business Analysis as defined in the Business Analysis Body of Knowledge (BABOK)® and PMI®-Business Analysis.

The purpose of this introductory course is to provide the foundation for understanding the roles and responsibilities of the Business Analyst in enabling change in an enterprise by defining needs and recommending solutions. This introductory course will immerse students into the fast-growing field of Business Analysis and the value they add to an organization. This course will explore the Business Analysis Core Concept Model (BACCM), further ensuring that students are equipped to consider the quality, completeness, and value of the solutions implemented based on the Business Analysis analysis and recommendations.

Finally, this course is part of a series of courses that leads to the Certificate in Business Analysis offered by UC Davis Continuing and Professional Education. The course may be taken either as a stand-alone course or as part of the certificate program. Taken as a stand-alone, the course provides a high-level introduction to basic concepts in business analysis and the business analyst role. The certificate program in its entirety provides an in-depth understanding of the practice of business analysis. The certificate program is designed to prepare you for a career as a Business Analyst and similar roles. While it should help you in your preparation for the Certified Business Analysis Professional (CBAP) examination offered by the International Institute of Business Analysis (IIBA)®, that is not this course's sole focus. However, we recognize that many of you are interested in the CBAP and this course should help you get there. By the end of the course, you will have an overview of the scope and activities that constitute the field of business analysis.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

By the time you finish this course you should be able to:

- 1. Explain the role of and typical tasks conducted by a business analyst
- 2. Discuss the value of business analysis when approaching complex business problems
- Use the Business Analysis Core Concept Model (BACCM) to analyze problems and develop solutions
- 4. Summarize the key traits and attitudes needed to be a successful business analyst
- 5. Discuss the similarities and differences between business analysis and project management
- 6. Define Key Industry Terms
- 7. Determine the scope of a given project
- 8. Discuss business analysis knowledge areas and explain the processes within each area
- 9. Explain the various Requirements Types
- 10. Examine the relationship between requirements and design as it relates to the activities performed by a Business Analyst

- 13. Develop an appropriate problem statement for a given project factoring in stakeholder requirements
- 14. Differentiate between and select an appropriate system development methodology for a given project

CLASS PARTICIPATION

In addition to our weekly webinar sessions, there are two ways to communicate with me and with each other in this course. The Canvas Inbox (sometimes referred to as "Conversations") feature is essentially a Canvas-wide email tool that will allow you to email your instructor, or fellow classmates through the system. You can use it to contact one person, multiple people, or the entire class, so do make sure you're using it appropriately and not sending your message to anyone you don't want to receive it. It may be used to ask questions and discuss any other information with any individuals, such as the instructor, you would prefer to keep confidential, just make sure only those individuals are in the "To" area, just like in a regular email application.

While there are some required, graded discussions in the Discussion area (each of which you should access by going through the Modules), you can also create your own discussion threads to ask general questions to your fellow classmates and instructor if you wish. Everyone has the ability to create and respond to any threads in the discussion and can be a wonderful place to share information, so I urge you to use this forum to share your thoughts and observations with the rest of the class. (Not answers to the activities and assignments, however!). Experience has shown you will get additional benefit from the course from these interactions; as well as enjoy your course experience more. Online students often indicate they miss the personal interactions in a classroom environment. These forums enable you to create your own "virtual classroom." REQUIRED READING

The narrated presentations and webinars conducted in this course presents an introduction to, and roadmap through, the various topics covered by the course. Important considerations are highlighted, and where there is controversy in the industry over the use of certain tools and techniques, that controversy is discussed. This high-level approach is supplemented with selected reading assignments from the course textbooks: *The International Institute of Business Analysis Body of Knowledge (IIBA BABOK)*® *Version 3.0*, and *Project Management Institute Business Analysis for Practitioners*. The instructor may also post links to specific articles from the internet that discuss certain topics in more detail.

Because of the targeted nature of the reading assignments, it is important to read them in conjunction with the modules in which they are assigned. The course is designed to give maximum benefit by this complementary use of the online lesson material and the assigned textbook readings.

GRADING AND ASSESSMENT

This course includes discussion questions, simple learning activities, quizzes, and more complex "artifact" assignments designed to (1) support the learning objectives for you, and (2) provide a measure, for both you and me, of your progress through the course. The grading breakdown is as follows:

- Artifact Assignments: 50%
- Discussion, Learning Activities, and Quizzes: 30%
- Final Exam: 20%

Activities and assignments are primarily set up for you to download a file, complete it offline, then upload the completed file from to the same Assignment page. I will attempt to reply to all submissions with feedback on a timely basis (comments and points earned), however, please understand that I currently run a very large procurement project for my company, and so it may take a few days. If you have a question about an assignment, you may ask for guidance via the Discussion Tool or Canvas Inbox, and I will do my best to answer.

At the conclusion of the course, a final examination will be given. This examination will be "open book", and will consist of a series of questions and problems that cover the entire course content. However, it is to be your personal work, so you are on the honor system not to discuss it with others or complete the exam with a partner or group. The final exam is worth 20% of your grade.
